Funeral Service To Be Held Friday For Leo C. Pelletier

A Mass of Resurrection will be sung at Notre Dame Church, Springvale, Friday at 10 a.m. for Leo C. Pelletier, preceded by prayers at 9 o'clock at the LaFrance and Boisvert Funeral Home, 29 Winter street, Sanford. Interment will be in Notre Dame Cemetery.

Mr. Pelletier, 54, who served the Town of Sanford as town clerk and tax collector for nearly 26 years, died Tuesday morning at a Portland hospital after a long illness.

Mr. Pelletier was born here Jan. 15, 1917, the son of Charles and Helen Stebbins Pelletier. He graduated from Sanford High School in the class of 1936, and from Gorham Normal School (now part of the University of Maine).

He taught school at St. Agatha in northern Maine for several years, then returned to Sanford and was teaching at the Hawthorne School when he entered the Army in 1941. He served four years with a medical detachment

and was discharged with the rank of sergeant.

First Elected In 1946

Mr. Pelletier was first elected town clerk and tax collector at a special election held Jan. 9, 1946 because of the resignation of the late Frank C. Creteau due to his appointment as Sanford postmaster. Mr. Pelletier had recently been discharged from the Army, was just short of 29 years of age when he was sworn into office, and was believed to have been the youngest man ever to hold the two offices. He was reelected in the annual election in December of that year, and every year after that. His work in the two offices was so well received that he was seldom (never in this writer's memory) opposed for reelection.

Because of his thorough knowledge of his job and the laws pertaining to it, he was frequently consulted by other city and town clerks.

In his capacity as town clerk, he served as secretary of the Town Warrant Committee, Planning Board and zoning Board of Appeals.

Mr. Pelletier was also active in community affairs. He was a member of the board of trustees of the Henrietta D. Goodall Hospital and secretary of the board's executive committee; was a member of the area coordinating committee of York County Counseling Services; a member of the board of trustees of the Springvale Public Library; and a director of the Springvale National Bank.

He was a communicant of Notre Dame Church, a member of the Parish Council, and had served as a lector in the Mass. He had also served on the board of the former St. Ignatius Regional High School.

He was a member of the Sanford Lodge of Elks, Thomas W. Cole Post of the American Legion, Prefontaine

Council, St. John the Baptist, and was a life member of the Sanford-Alfred Historical Society.

Mr. Pelletier resided at 27 Ellsworth street, Springvale. He is survived by his parents, of Springvale; his wife, Mrs. Dorothy M. Shields Pelletier; four daughters, the Misses Jeanne, Patricia, Maureen and Michele Pelletier; two brothers, Rudolphe Pelletier of Greenland, N. H., and Paul Pelletier of Miami, Fla.; and two sisters, Miss Anita Pelletier of Sanford and Mrs. Shirley Brocato of Portland.

Town offices will be closed Friday until 1 p.m. in tribute to Mr. Pelletier.

higher than those paid to some present employees holding similar positions. The Selectmen said they had included the fringe benefits in the salary figures they proposed.

It was pointed out that the federal program is to run for 11 months, and that actually, due to the time required to fill the positions, the period will be nearer 10 months. Therefore, salaries under the program would be less than if they were paid for a full 12-month period.

The Selectmen stated that they plan to contact the Municipal Association immediately to clarify the confusion.

The Jobs Approved

The 11 jobs approved are: assistant to building inspector, \$583; clerk for town office, \$342.70; assistant to town engineer, \$727.81; additional fire fighter, \$623.91; mechanic for town garage, \$436; parks department maintenance man, \$391.23; security officer for high school complex, \$611.36; additional school custodian, \$425.36; library aide, \$281.36; speech therapist for schools, \$719.36; music teacher, \$636.37.

Applications for the school positions will be available at the school department office, and for all other positions at the selectmen's office. The Selectmen said they hope to fill the general government positions by Nov. 1.

Requirements laid down for hiring of applicants are that priority must be given to unemployed persons over underemployed, that the Employment Service will first refer special veterans and then other Vietnam veterans, that participants shall have been unemployed for 30 days or longer, and that participants shall reside within the town.

PUBLIC SERVANT AND FRIEND

There is grief in the hearts of the people of Sanford this week. Few public officials, or other individuals for that matter, are regarded with the respect and affection that people of his community felt for Leo Pelletier, Sanford town clerk and tax collector for nearly 26 years, who passed away Tuesday.

He was respected for the ability, faithfulness and devotion he gave to his important job. He was frequently consulted by other town and city clerks because of his knowledge of state laws affecting his work, such as new laws relating to election procedures. He also gave generously of his time and energy to civic and church organizations.

Leo enjoyed his professional work and his civic activities because his natural abilities and educational background prepared him well for them, but even more, we are sure, because he loved people.

Almost every resident of the town has business in the town clerk and tax collector's office at some time, and he literally knew just about everyone in the community. If anyone wanted to know some detail about the town or its people, the watchword was "Ask Leo". He was endlessly patient, cheerful and helpful to people who came to his office or telephoned for information. His sprightly sense of humor, love of fun, and friendliness made him a delightful person to know.

One of the last times this writer saw Leo was the special town meeting called in June of this year. Though very ill even then, he attended in order to carry out his job as town clerk —while so many town meeting members were unconcerned about their town that the meeting had to be adjourned due to lack of a quorum. He came to the office as often as he was able during the last few months and was thinking about his work even in the last few days of his life.

Having visited his office once a week or oftener for some 20 years during rounds of the municipal offices as a reporter, this writer feels a great personal loss.

We are grateful for the help he always gave so willingly and for the great privilege and pleasure of having him as a friend. We extend sincerest sympathy to his family. Those words, we are sure, express the feeling this week of the literally thousands of people who knew Leo Pelletier.

More May Come Later OK Given Town Of Sanford For 11 Public Service Jobs

The Board of Selectmen has been notified that 11 of the 22 public service jobs requested by the Town of Sanford under the new federal Emergency Employment Act have been approved. It is anticipated that additional jobs will be provided under a supplemental grant made to the state, the Selectmen said.

The Maine Municipal Association stated in a letter to the Board that a total of 169,600 has been allotted to Sanford for salaries of the 11 new employees. The town's share of the cost is \$1,767,

which would be an "in-kind" contribution of training, supervision, materials, bookkeeping, office space, etc., and would involve no cash expenditure, the Selectmen said. There is some confusion, however, as to whether the salaries listed for the jobs include the prospective employees' share of fringe benefits such as social security, workers' compensation and retirement. If they don't, the monthly salaries would be

York County Job Program Receives Federal Approval

Approval for hiring 17 persons to be employed by several York County governmental agencies has been approved under the new Federal Emergency Employment Act, according to the York County Commissioners. The sum of \$78,152 has been allocated to the county.

Some of the jobs will start Nov. 1, some Dec. 1, and some as of April 1 of next year.

A number of applicants are being handled through the Maine Employment Security Commission offices. Husey said, adding his agency had been "flooded" with calls from those wanting to take part in the new program.

The jobs to be filled and the monthly salaries for each include two turnkeys and a cook for the county jail at \$603 each, a bookkeeper for the county jail, \$401; a switchboard operator for the county courthouse, \$380; a clerk for the Registry of Deeds, \$380; a custodian for the courthouse, \$380.

Gendron Lumber To Build New Plant In So. Sanford

Ground was broken Tuesday for a combination store-office warehouse building to be constructed for N. J. Gendron Lumber Company in South Sanford. The building is to be located on Route 108, the Wells road, next to the John Tucker Chevrolet Garage.

Several years ago the Gendron firm purchased 400 feet of frontage on the Wells road, and earlier this year bought an additional 350 feet of frontage adjacent to the original parcel. The two parcels together make up a total of approximately 750 feet of frontage and 1,700 feet in depth, or a total acreage of just under 30 acres. The firm is planning to use approximately 500 feet of frontage and 800 feet in depth for the new building and storage yard.

The new structure will be a multi-story building, a relatively new type of metal building construction. The building is being designed by Sawyer, Brown & Martin, Inc., consultants, and the materials will be manufactured by the Behler Manufacturing Company of Columbia, Neb.

Unusual Design
The Behler Building is an ideal form of warehouse construction in that there are no space-eating columns or overhead trusses, providing 100 per cent usable interior space. This form of construction is known technically as a "wide-span, stress-skin steel structural system" and employs heavy-gauge, curved 41-inch wide steel wall panels which are bolted together to form a deep corrugated structure that provides enormous strength.

The roof and ceiling are actually one component stressed in such a way that no columns or trusses are necessary. This is possible in roofs which span up to 250 feet. Inside walls are insulated with a gravel-core and one-half-inch-thick layer of cellulose fiber known as "K-13." On the outside the panels have an eight-mil-thick vinyl finish that is baked on at the factory.

Fireproof Structure
All components of the building are completely fireproof, including the insulation, and the building will be completely sprinklered for fire protection of the contents. The store and offices will be heated by forced hot water-type boilers suspended from the ceiling each thermostatically controlled to maintain a constant 65-degree temperature.

There are only a few Behler buildings in Maine. They include the field house and

36,000 Square Feet

The dimensions of the Gendron building will be 172 by 162 feet. There will be two clear-span areas in the interior, one 80 by 160 feet and the other 80 by 160 feet. Some portions of the building will have a second floor, with the result that the structure will have a total footage of slightly over 36,000 square feet.

Construction of a large paved parking area and paved access to and from the Wells road. Both the building and the yard have been designed to provide for maximum use of mechanical equipment in materials handling.

Completion of the project is expected in approximately six months if the weather delays are not too severe. At the site of the new building of the Gendron Lumber Company will be moved from its present location on Lebanon street to the new plant.

Contract Awarded
The general contract has been awarded to Brown Construction, Inc. of Portland, the firm that built the new Sanford High School.

Officials of the lumber company emphasized that the contract with Brown Construction stipulates that as much local labor as possible will be used and that local contractors will receive preference in award of subcontracts.

Officials of the company gave no estimated cost for the project, stating that the cost has not yet been completely determined.

Further Development Of Area Planned
Officials added that Gendron Lumber Company is working on plans for development of the remainder of the land which it owns at the South Sanford site. Approximately 350 feet of frontage on the Wells road, mainly, which would be suitable for use in commercial and industrial sites, and land in the rear may be developed into commercial and industrial sites, or even for residential use.

The Gendron firm is already in contact with several commercial and industrial developers and has received enthusiastic responses from all of them relative to the potential which this land affords for future development, officials of the firm said.

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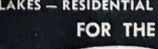
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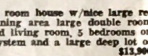

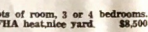
