At mid-afternoon our bombers were air-borne again and headed southeast to attack Porto San Stefano Harbor. Bomb hits were observed across west end of dock area and in edge of town. At the NW end of the harbor an explosion was reported from a hit on building near base of quay. No enemy defense action whatsoever was encountered. All bombers returned safely to base.

We went after two M/V's reported to be moored along main quay in the harbor of San Stefano. Our aim was poor and our bombs missed the vessels. However bomb hits were observed in dock area at base of main quay, E along inner harbor and edge of town. Some light flak, bursting below the flight was experienced as the formation passed over the town of San Stefano. All 12 of our bombers came home safely to base.

No flak or fighters interrupted the formation and at 1700 hrs all bombers had returned safely.





Our bombardiers struck at shipping in Sestri Levante Harbor with deadly accuracy today. It was the most concentrated exhibition of bombing that has been accomplished in some time. One 3000 ton M/V anchored in harbor received two direct hits and many near misses. When last seen the vessel was listing badly and settling astern. 3 landing barges estimated to be 150 feet destroyed by direct hits. Several strings of bombs walked across main quay and small adjacent jetty causing much damage. Main dock installations received many bomb hits. Two small craft at anchor near main dock area were also destroyed.



Leghorn Oil Storage was our target for today. Our bombing pattern was quite effective too. Most bombs fell across southern part of oil storaged dump with four direct hits on storage tanks. Others fell across canal in vicinity of power station resulting in one large explosion at that point along with considerable heavy smoke. The formation encountered a slight amount of inaccurate light and heavy flak in the vicinity of the target. There were no enemy fighter interceptions. All our bombers returned to base.



Another search for enemy shipping was made today and the formation of eight B-25 G's found fairly good hunting. Two 40-50 ft. fishing boats attacked in harbor of Follonica. One hit was seen on one of the boats. Further results unknown. Several hits on dock and adjacent harbor installations were observed. The formation also shelled Porto San Stefano Harbor. One hit was observed on a 100 foot schooner stationary there. Several hits in town on buildings and quay were reported and smoke was seen coming from one building near the water. Along the coast just south of Follonica, the flight experienced slight to moderate inscurate light flak. Moderate fairly accurate light flak greeted them from positions in the hills surrounding San Stefano. All ships returned safely to base.

Our main objective today was the shipping in the Canal at Leghorn Harbor but due to the wall of clouds surrounding the target, bombardiers were unable to line up on the target craft. Strings of bombs were seen to fall in building area adjacent to railroad yards causing considerable damage. Direct hits on adjacent canal were made by other bombs from these strings resulting in the possible destruction of a bridge over the canal at this point. Other bombs were seen to hit in railroad yards leading to inner harbor. Direct hits were scored on railroad bridge leading from railroad yards to N main quay at Victor Emmanuel Harbor. Bomb bursts also seen on edge of buildings just south of iron works. Moderate Light and slight to moderate heavy flak of good range and poor deflection was encountered by our formation over the target area. All of our ships returned safely to base.



At 42 deg 36 min N, 10 deg 56 min W. two barges estimated 150' long and one escort vessel estimated 100' long heading NW, slightly staggered in trail were attacked. Three direct hits were scored an escort vessel causing much damage and starting a fire astern. A near miss was made on barge to the rear of the escort vessel. Further results were not observed. Slight inaccurate heavy and intense accurate light flak was encountered from the target vessels. The craft in which Lt. Betts was flying was hit in the nose by a burst of flak. Lt. Betts however skillfully piloted the damaged bomber back to base safely. The other three B-25's landed without mishap.





There was no shipping at our primary target, Port Ercole, so Porto San Stefano again bore the brunt of the attack when the group sent eighteen B-25's. Bombs were dropped on shipping and warehouses at San Stefano, with good results on each. One small M/V and two 150's barges were destroyed in the harbor, and excellent coverage of the warehouse area was observed. Several bombs fell on the railroad west of the warehouses, and the entire target area was covered by considerable smoke. There was very little flak and it was inaccurate, and no enemy aircraft was to be seen. All our planes returned safely.

Our daily attack on San Stefano was kept up on this mission, with eighteen planes attacking shipping and port facilities in the San Stefano Harbor. One 125' boat received one direct hit and two near misses, while near misses were scored on a large warehouse back of town and direct hits were seen on the incline of a road bridge over a railroad. Several of the planes dropped their bombs on Port Ercole Harbor, with two 130' boats (believed to be "E" boats) being destroyed by the concussion of two near misses, one barge being destroyed, and two barges being badly damaged.

Slight, inaccurate, light flak from S. Stefano, and slight, inaccurate, light and heavy flak from Port Ercole was encountered, but all planes returned to the base safely.

Our target on this mission was shipping, with low-level attack, and a target consisting of two "E" boats was sighted just outside Port Ercole Harbor. Both boats were attacked, but one gained cover while the other was aggressive and came out to meet our planes. Smoke was seen, after one pass, to be coming from this latter boat, but the boat evidently got away with no more than slight damage, and had had enough fight for one day.

This mission served a special purpose in that it ran all the boats in this vicinity back into Port Ercole Harbor at a timely moment for our bombers to catch them there a few minutes later.

All of our planes returned safely to their base.

Luck was with us on this mission to bomb shipping in Leghorn Harbor, for we found a large amount of enemy shipping in the harbor. The sky was clear, and the flak inaccurate light flak, so a good run was made on this target, and the crews did a good job. As the smoke started clearing away it became evident that the group and squadron had here what was almost surely their most successful mission to date in the Corsican campaign. The mission had resulted in the sinking of one-420 M/V, one 330 M/V, one 175 M/V, one 200 yacht, and two-110 barges, as well as causing damage to the quays in the harbor.

Photographs were taken of the results of the mission, and leaving the enemy with several less boats with which to haul his vital supplies to the Italian battle lines, our planes all 18 returned safely to their base.

Our target today was Tarquinia Airdrome, and it brought back old memories of days when we were carrying out most of our missions against enemy airdromes. This was our first attack on an air drome since we started operation from Corsica, and most of the boys were eager to go on the mission.

Aircraft not being our main target, we dropped most of the bombs on the runway and taxi-strips, and had numerous hits on both. The runway already had craters from previous bombings, but we continued to put the field in such a condition that much repair would be necessary before the enemy can use it as a base for his fighters in Italy.

Unlike most of our previous attacks on airdromes, we encountered no flak nor fighters today, and all twelve of our planes returned safely.

DAY

- I Most of the men started the month by sending money home through War Department Finance. However, there were those few who could not send anything. Last night's games "cleaned" them completely. They didn't seem to mind, though. This is the short month and payday will come again. There was an exciting and thrilling movie this evening. At least that's what Hollywood intended it to be. It was "Bombardier", starring Pat O'Brien, and depicting the training of the U.S. Air Forces bombardiers. Our bombardiers razzed it more than anyone. Evidently this picture was produced for the folks at home, as are all war pictures.
- 2 A very pretty day with everyone enjoying the sunshine as much as possible. The men are thankful for not having thick, sticking mud to contend with this winter as they did in Africa last winter. The boys maintain good spirits as long as the weather is mild. Another movie tonight! This time the picture was "The Constant Nymph", with Charles Boyer and Joan Fontaine.
- 3 Pancakes for breakfast this morning, and they were rather tasty. All the boys get up when hotcakes are on the menu. There was a small mail call this noon, but not nearly enough to satisfy the fellows. There can never be too much mail. Fresh meat for supper--Pork chops being the main course. It was a good supper, but not quite enough chops. Eighteen EM of the 381st Bomb Sq. were attached to the squadron this afternoon for rations only. While twenty EM of Hq. 310th Bomb Gp. were released this morning from attachment for rations only. No wonder the Mess has such a difficult time trying to feed its own men. This evening The 347th Fighter Sq. entertained with a show for the third successive night. The picture was very enjoyable, too. "The Butler's Sister", with Deanna Durbin and Pat O'Brien. This is the type movie the men want.
- 4 A terrific wind came out of the mountains and blew most of the morning and afternoon making the entire day miserable. Started sprinkling just before the evening meal. A flight of B-17's landed this afternoon, having been on a mission over southern France. They were from the 2nd & 99th Bomb Gps. Thirty-nine of the officers and seventy-six of the enlisted men ate supper with us. They are scheduled to take off temorrow for their home base, weather permitting.
- 5 This was a happy Saturday for the men-a tremendous amount of mail came in.

 Most of the boys got ten to fifteen letters. Squadron Intelligence, and Operations moved into the wooden building adjacent to the one previously occupied, which was just about to collapse. The B-17's left for their home bases.

 Twenty-two EM, 381st Bomb Sq., were attached to the squadron for rations only.

 The total mess attendance for the day was 1382 men.
- 6 The squadron got six new crews from Philipville today. Our squadron is almost at full strength again. Had pork chops for supper tonight.
- 7 More new men arrived by plane from Philipville to join the squadron. They came just in time to enjoy hamburgers for supper. There was a small mail call in the late afternoon, and the night brought another movie. Charles Coburn in "My Kingdom for a Cook", a farce about an English author visiting America that gave the boys plenty of laughs. Two-hundred twenty-four enlisted men of the 381st

 Bomb Sq. were released from attachment for rations.
- 8 Men and planes continue to come in from Philipvile. Our baker made delicious sugared doughnuts for the evening meal, but only two per man.

EVENTS

9 Among the PX rations issued today were cigarettes, cigars, candy, chewing gum, and soap. Had steak for dinner, which put the boys in good shape for the mail call in the afternoon.

10 Clothes were issued today for those who turned in salvage recently. The men never have too many clothes. However, everyone seems to be well outfitted at the present. There was a genuine western thriller this evening at the local movie house. Don "Red" Barry starred in "The Blackhill Express". It was the first western shown in sometime.

11 Two officers and two EM, 500th Sq (British), were attached to the squadron this morning for rations only. Was a cold day, and most of the men stayed in as much as possible.

12 S/Sgt. Paul G. Bernstein, Group Photo Section-Head, was released from attachment to Hg. 310th Bomb. Gp. for rations only today. The two officers and two EM of the 500th Sq. (British), were released from attachment for rations only. Fresh ground beef hamburgers on the menu for dinner, and every man had his fill.

13 For the second time in four days PX rations were issued. The area has a new theatre--the building recently vacated by Intelligence and Operations. Opening night was celebrated with a double feature. William Bendix and Grace Bradley in "Taxi Mister", and a reshowing of "Blackhill Express". Was also a small amount of mail in tonight.

14 A quiet day. The men busied themselves with the usual routine duties. The winter is passing quickly, and the coming of spring is anxiously awaited,

15 Squadron communications finished wiring the enlisted men's tent area this afternoon. Each tent is authorized one light.

16 Another one of those very important days: Bag after bag of mail was called, including packages, papers, and letters.

17 Had another movie this evening in the area theatre. Warren William in "Passport to Suez", a story of espionage and murder.

18 Today was a day of feasting. Our Mess had fresh meat for dinner and supper to give us. Steak for the noon meal and hamburgers for supper. The men have had more fresh meat in Corsica than they had in the many months spent in Africa. Major J.J. Dent, Lts. Carrol Hament, and Eliot H. Potter left today for detached

service. destination unknown.

19 Trucks went to the bath-house in the mountains this morning at 9 alm. and this afternoon at 2:30. This is the only opportunity the men have to take a bath. FX rations were issued again this afternoon.

20 Church services were conducted this morning in the nearby chapel. It was a beautiful Sunday -- the kind of day a Sunday should be-calm and peaceful.

21 Two good meals today: Hotcakes for breakfast, and creamed chicken for dinner. And for the night's entertainment there were two shows. "Bomber Moon" in our area and "Dangerous Blondes" at the 347th Fighter Sq. area.

22 Two trucks went to the saw-mill to get any scrap wood available for the officers and enlisted men in the area. Everyone was chopping, and before nightfall all the wood was cut and stacked in the rooms and tents.

23 This morning the mess hall had a special treat for the men. Fresh butter on the hotcakes. It made all the difference in the world, and the boys did enjoy the meal. Fresh butter is rarer than fresh meat in this country.

26 The rain stopped today, but the sky was still dark with low, overhanging clouds.


Was bath day and many of the fellows hopped on the trucks and made the trip

THE ITALIAN CAMPAIGN (CONT'D) 1944 FEBRUARY

February, 1944, was destined to open with much activity, grow into a period of very extensive operation, and then slow down into inactivity, with the weather playing the major role at the end of the month.

As the month opened for the squadron, the B-25'c's were busy searching the coasts of southern France and western Italy for enemy shipping and making it hot for any shipping sighted. These missions consisted of both sea searches for chance sightings, and of strikes against shipping reported from other sources. Successes came more frequently as the month progressed, and numerous axis boats ranging from barges to merchant vessels, were sent to Davy Jones' Locker.


On February 9, new B-25 G's and H's and their crews started arriving for the squadron, and they joined in the fight, starting on February 12. From that date, we had B-25 C's, G's, and H's searching the waters east and north of Corsica frequently, and destroying enemy vessels with both medium and low-level attacks. With B-25 C's being few in number, B-25 G's and H's were soon to take their place as wing ships to the C's, and to drop their bombs with the element leader.

Jerry soon became annoyed at our attacks in his vital shipping lanes. These boats were necessary to his war machine along the Anzio Beach-head and the main battle-line, as they were usually loaded with all the needs for continuing the Italian War. A breach in this vital line of supplies would greatly hamper the Nazi War Machine in Italy, so Jerry was forced to take new measures of protection for this shipping. He started hiding his ships in harbors during the day, and making his runs at night. This called for new tactics on our part, so we started going into the harbors, finding the boats there, and sinking them. Leghorn, Porto San Stefano, Talamone, Porto Ferraio, Piombino, Viareggio, and Port Ercole were some of the German-held harbors that felt the blows of our attacks, with numerous ships ranging up to 5,000 tons in size being blasted and sunk in these harbors. When shipping could not be found in these places, quays, docks, dock installations, and other military objectives in the area received their share of the blows. All of this time, the "Flying Cannons" kept up their low-level attacks on shipping in open waters and in small harbors, and kept the Axis boats in the harbors so they would make good targets for the bombers. Other targets included were Targuinia A/D, and RR tracks and equipment North of Civitavecchia.


Among the most successful attacks of the month were those on Leghor, Sestri Levante, and Viareggio harbors. On February 12, one 3,000 ton M/V and three landing barges were sunk in Sestri Levante Harbor. On February 18, we had our most successful mission of the month when one 5,000 ton M/V, one 320° M/V, one 175° M/V, one 200° yacht, and two 110° barges were sunk in Leghorn Harbor. The Viareggio Harbor raid on Feb. 20, resulted in twelve 80-100° schooners, and eight 35° fishing vessels being sunk and destroyed.

All this good work was not to continue uninterrupted, for on Feb. 24, rainy weather set in, and operations ceased entirely for the remainder of the month.
